These confiscated documents, some dating back to the 1800's, have been scattered in highly secret caches throughout the United States, Canada and overseas. Now, in a broadcast of historical significance and in the penetrating tradition of the controversial NEW YORK TIMES "Pentagon Papers" publication . . . WRKL listeners will be the first to hear on radio the revealing contents of the "Broken Treaties Papers" which, the Indians claim, offer incontrovertible evidence that they have been cheated out of their land and water rights . . . and have otherwise been subjected to general exploitation and repression.

and Seth S., all pre-adolescents, hit safely, but it was too late in the day. The sun was setting.

The final score, by mutual agreement, was 25-11, in favor of the Rats.
